Implementation of Course Mission: By utilizing the *Folio Thinking Process*, which empowers the student in the integration of their college learning and life experiences, the students prepare for the post-university experience as college graduate and global citizen leader. This institutional capstone event enriches the reflective process connecting your discipline, career, and role in community, with your new role of emerging alumni and productive citizen. To best assure the achievement of the course objective, the student will develop a **College Senior Portfolio** for use in the post-university experience. The portfolio is used to enhance the career search and/or graduate school search. This representational portfolio archives the "reflective" learning history and exhibits the "best work" which assists the student in gaining a better vision of the emerging role as college graduate and citizen leader.

"...portfolios are highly regarded as effective learning tools which encourage students to demonstrate many kinds of talent by creating and collecting artifacts meant to represent effective thinking skills, positive value states and additional accomplishments" (Hauser, 1994, p.50). Portfolios inspire learning through a rich, authentic, and valid assessment of student achievement (Calfee & Perfumo, 1993)...Such artifact collections, "holistically portray student journeys toward various competencies" (Hauser, 1994, p. 54).
